CHARTER SONG

Words and Music by John Kirkpatrick in 2023 Written and composed for the 450th anniversary celebrations of the granting of the Town Charter to Bishop's Castle

The song comes in several sections. The tempo stays the same throughout.

- It starts with a brass fanfare 16 bars. This is based on one of the tunes believed to be unique to The Bishop's Castle Town Band, which sadly has not appeared for some years. This tune is referred to by its members as "Sausage".
- Then a four bar link on accordion leading into the singing. On the synthesised recording the accordion link is represented by a solo vocal sound.
- There is a verse/chorus section with three verses, followed by a four bar accordion link each time. On the synthesised track there is only one verse/chorus. All three verses can be heard on the individual vocal tracks.
- There are the usual four parts for the choir. The top line is called "Tune" rather than "Soprano" as there will be mixed male and female voices on the parts.
- After the third verse and chorus the link is different, leading into the extract from an anthem in praise of Queen Elizabeth I by her court composer William Byrd
- The four parts expand into five, with two alto lines,
- Two lines on accordion introduce the "Bells" section, sung to peals of the six church bells in St John the Baptist Church.
- Then a double reprise of the chorus
- The brass come in again at the end on the final chorus.
